

CIRCULAR ECONOMY INCUBATOR PROGRAM LAUNCHES GREEN VENTURES OUT OF QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY

Nine innovative entrepreneurs pitched to a panel of industry professionals on Tuesday evening for the chance to win up to \$10,000 of seed funding, marking the culmination of Queen's University's inaugural Green Summer Incubator Program. These undergraduate students, graduate students, and alumni mark a new wave of innovators whose solutions lead the way toward a regenerative circular economy.

The Queen's Venture Creation, Experiential Learning & Net-Zero Training (QVENT) Green Summer Incubator Program is a collaboration between the Dunin-Deshpande Queen's Innovation Centre (DDQIC), the Smith School of Business Centre for Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Social Impact, and Project Zero, a national circular economy incubator. Over four months, innovative entrepreneurs developed and polished their business plan and pitch, built a foundation of business fundamentals and entrepreneurial skills, received one-on-one mentorship, and networked with industry experts and fellow entrepreneurs.

Project Zero has been running the Incubator program in British Columbia since 2019, graduating over 60 ventures within the circular economy and creating over 140 jobs across the province. QVENT's Green Summer Incubator Program is the first Incubator by Project Zero to be offered elsewhere in Canada.

The pitch event winners were:

X-8 Circular Fashion Club (\$4,000) – Zoe Zhu & Yanxi Chen

An online thrifting experience with an AI fashion design function and on-demand graphic printing services designed to give pre-loved vintage garments a new life.

YieldFly (\$4,000) – Kie Pongsupha

A sustainable, circular agricultural solution vertically farming black soldier flies as a source of animal feed and organic fertilizer.

Cognitech AI Solutions (\$1,000) - Rejoice van der Walk

A responsive AI-enabled leak detection solution for municipal water infrastructure that saves money, protects infrastructure, reduces water loss, and enhances resource efficiency.

Renovation Scout (\$1,000) – Prachi Jangid & Alena Miazga

An app that guides new homeowners through renovations, including project plan generation, green retrofit recommendations, code compliance checks, insurance premium alerts, health and safety alerts, green rebates, and more.

What is the circular economy?
